
Tutor Reading Book of the Month: We Should All Be Feminists by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie

Students in Year 11 have the opportunity to read *We Should All Be Feminists* by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie as part of the tutor reading programme. Taken from her globally influential TED talk, this is Ngozi Adichie's feminist manifesto. A powerful, personal essay of hope and ambition for a better, fairer world. This is a personal and powerful essay from Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, the bestselling author of *Americanah* and *Half of a Yellow Sun*.

'I would like to ask that we begin to dream about and plan for a different world. A fairer world. A world of happier men and happier women who are truer to themselves. And this is how to start: we must raise our daughters differently. We must also raise our sons differently...'

She asks, what does 'Feminism' mean today?

In this personal, eloquently argued essay - adapted from her much-admired TEDx talk of the same name - Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie offers readers a unique definition of Feminism for the twenty-first century, one rooted in inclusion and awareness.



Drawing extensively on her own experiences and her deep understanding of the often masked realities of sexual politics, here is one remarkable author's exploration of what it means to be a woman now - an of-the-moment rallying cry for why we should all be feminists.

The talk was a fascinating insight into how from humble beginnings and striving with the right mental and personal attitude that great things can be achieved. Particularly nice was the constant reinforcement that looking after your own mental wellbeing, resilience and moral outlook are as significant in success as academic achievement. The message being that success is a very personal thing and this might look different for everyone. The talk also highlighted elements of social justice and recognition of the importance of women as leaders and role models. In all, a fantastic speaker and we were very grateful to Julie for accepting the invitation that Ms Brownell had extended.

The spotlight them turned to the students and their incredible achievements. Awards, certificates and cups were presented by Julie, Mr Hardy-Cork and Mr Colton. All students present came up to the stage to collect their GCSE certificates. Head of Year, Mrs Clark was a magnificent presenter with her stories of the year group and she kept the whole event flowing. After much cheering and clapping there were speeches by the Head and Deputy Head Girl and finally closing words from Ms Japp.

It would be quite some time before the hall was empty. Students had photos taken under the balloon arch or in front of the stage. People exchanged stories and caught up with missed friends. Meanwhile, site staff cleared away and Mrs Habbershaw, without whom this event would never have been so successful, finally managed to sit down after weeks of organising in the background. In all, it was an absolute delight to share in the achievements of a phenomenal set of students, who are becoming impressive young adults. 







Stunning Sculptures





























Creative Cubes
