
Year 8 Hydrogen Fuel Cell Workshop

Last week, the Design and Technology Department hosted a Hydrogen Fuel Cell Workshop offered by STEM UK and the Yorkshire Energy Park with observers from East Riding Council Business and Workforce Skill section. Twenty three Year 8 students enjoyed building and racing buggies powered by hydrogen and learnt about the future potential of this fuel in road and air transport. We were very lucky to get a chance to use these very expensive pieces of equipment.

This region is due to further benefit from huge investment in green fuels on the back of the large emerging wind industry. It looks like an exciting time for engineering in this locality. Our pupils learnt about the plans to develop the site on the Humber and future job opportunities. The Energy Park is aiming for 80% local employment. Thank you to Head of D&T Mrs Colley for organising the workshop.

This takes the form of a ten-week project that students work on independently. Tutor Reading Book of the Month: No-one is Too Small to Make a Difference by Greta Thunberg

Students in Year 11 have the opportunity to read this book as part of the tutor reading programme. Collecting Greta Thunberg's speeches together in one volume, this timely book lays bare the eloquence and fury that drive a global environmental movement.

'Everything needs to change. And it has to start today'

In August 2018 a fifteen-year-old Swedish girl, Greta Thunberg, decided not to go to school one day. Her actions ended up sparking a global movement for action against the climate crisis, inspiring millions of pupils to go on strike for our planet, forcing governments to listen, and earning her a Nobel Peace Prize nomination.

This book brings you Greta in her own words, for the first time. Collecting her speeches that have made history across Europe, from the UN to mass street protests, *No One Is Too Small to Make A Difference* is a rallying cry for why we must all wake up and fight to protect the living planet, no matter how powerless we feel. Our future depends upon it.

Netball




