## French Trip to Lille

## BRIDLINGTON ANIMAL PARK



On Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> July the Science department took two coaches of Y7 students to Bridlington Animal Park in Carnaby.

Bridlington Animal Park is a local, award winning, family owned business that had an array of birds and animals for students to observe and interact with. Throughout the day we explored the park, observing animals from savanna ecosystems such as the African plains, South America and the Australian outback to native temperate ecosystems.

This fits perfectly with the current Y7 Biology ecosystem topic and allowed us to discuss concepts such as abiotic and biotic factors and how an organism is adapted to its environment. Additionally, there were several opportunities throughout the day to interact with the animals and birds and have the opportunity to find out more about certain species through informative interactive talks and one to one discussion with park handlers. A thoroughly enjoyable day.





## GCSE Geography Fieldtrip

Year 10 had a good day at Withernsea beach, getting stuck into some geography fieldwork. They started with some nail varnishing of stones to look for evidence of longshore drift (we found them later in the day further along the beach). They collected lucky piddock stones as evidence of biological weathering, and then measured the longshore drift either side of the groynes and through the action of the waves. They celebrated their first school trip since COVID with fish and chips in the sunshine. It was a lovely day. Well done to all involved, both staff and students.

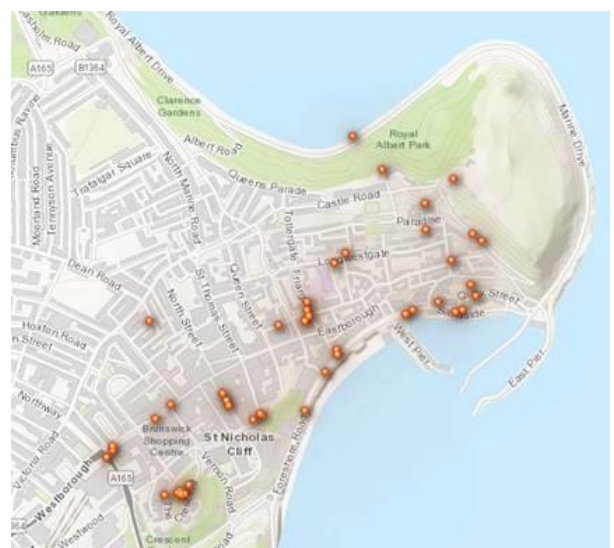


## A Level Geography Fieldtrip

Using i-pads they were able to use GIS to enter and map their data, which was good experience for completing their data collection for their Independent Investigation in Year 13.

## Eurofest at Hymers

A group of 12 Year 8 students spent a day at Hymers School in early July. Eurofest is an annual opportunity for Year 8 students to use their language skills to develop a product and market and sell it in a foreign language. Our 4 teams all competed in German and all did really well with one team being awarded a prize for the best use of spoken German.



## National Spelling Bee Competition



Congratulations to Year 7 students Georgia S, Sophie B and Meryem C who took part in the National Spelling Bee final at the University of Cambridge on Friday 30<sup>th</sup> June. Students had to learn 4 stages with 50/100 words at each stage (300 altogether) in either French or German. All three students did an amazing job and managed to get into the top 99 out of 21.000 contestants. What a great achievement!



## National Translation Bee Competition

Last month, three of our Year 8 students went to the Regional Final of the Translation Bee competition at the University of Lancaster.

They had to learn sentences in German in different tenses off by heart and then had to translate them into German.

They were in the final 57 out of 13,730 who started the competition at the beginning of the year. They did an amazing job of representing Beverley High School and a huge thank you to parents for accompanying them on the trip.





## Greenpower Race at Blyton Park

The newly named Hilda Lyon Racing Team took part in the Greenpower event at Blyton Park, Lincolnshire on July 6<sup>th</sup>. They all had a blast! This year's team included Charlotte R, Lucy B, Holly O and Eadie C in Year 11 and new members Izzy D in Year 10, Martha C, Beth F, Elli B in Year 8 and Darcy B, Mya C and Meryem C in Year 7. For each event, the team entered our two electric cars for the two races that lasted 90 minutes each; the winner is the one who completes the most laps. Both cars completed more laps than they did last year and finished 7<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> in the first race, 11<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup> in the second due to electrical problems. In the car's best race they completed 37 and 35 laps. This is a great improvement- our previous highest number of completed laps on the Blyton park circuit was 29. The competition was fierce, all opposing teams were really close, 4<sup>th</sup> to 8<sup>th</sup> place completed 37 laps, just 1 lap less than 3<sup>rd</sup> place!

The new gear ratio coupled with their brilliant driving skills showed that more speed could be achieved without compromising the performance of the electric motor and battery life. Our students all showed great leadership, teamwork, resilience, and organisational skills throughout the year during the building of the cars. The students also took their media commitment seriously when they were interviewed by BBC Look North. Next year, we will welcome new members to move the team forward. We have a few ideas to improve the performance of the cars. We plan a new design for the rear of the cars and a new electronic system to give us a 'soft start' to harvest more from the batteries to get more speed for the motor with an even more ambitious gear ratio.

Each concert featured pupils from Years 7 to 13 and included solos, duets, trios and ensembles in a wide range of musical styles. We very much enjoyed welcoming the audience and performers for drinks and nibbles afterwards.

We are extremely proud of all the young musicians who took part and look forward to providing many more pupils with opportunities to perform in the future.

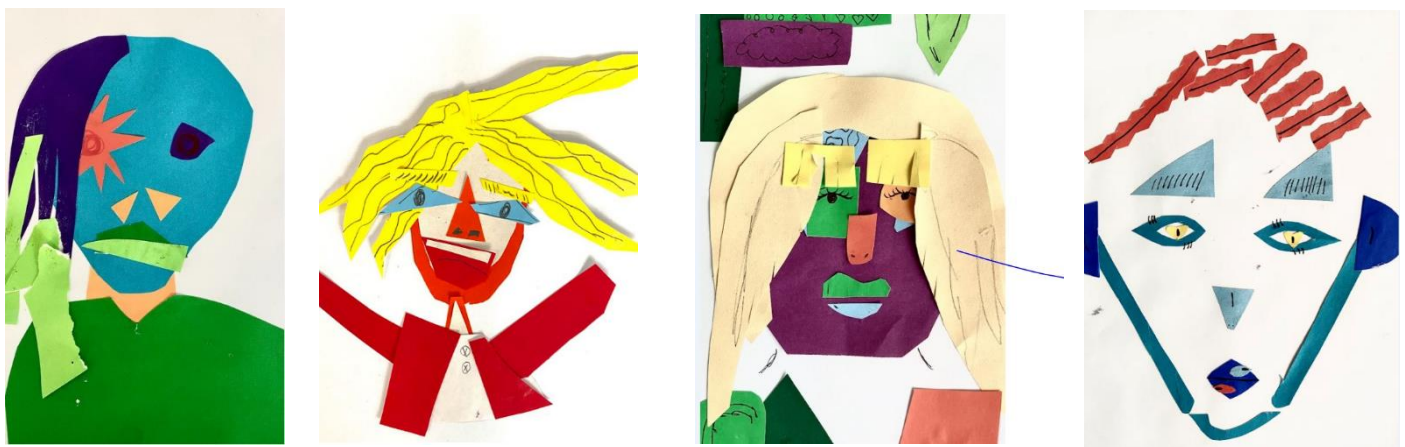
## Year 6 Transition Day and Parents' Evening

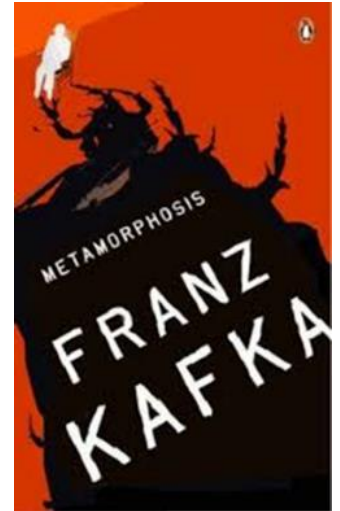


## Tutor Reading Book of the Month: *The Metamorphosis* by Franz Kafka

Students in Year 9 and 10 have the opportunity to read *The Metamorphosis* by Franz Kafka as part of the Tutor Reading programme. *The Metamorphosis* is a symbolic story by Austrian writer Franz Kafka, published in German as *Die Verwandlung* in 1915.

The opening sentence of *The Metamorphosis* has become one of the most famous in Western literature: 'As Gregor Samsa awoke one morning from uneasy dreams, he found himself transformed in his bed into a gigantic insect.' (Although Samsa has sometimes been described as a cockroach, the German word *Ungeziefer* does not refer to a particular bug). His tyrannical father forces him to hide in his bedroom, and Gregor slowly dies from both his family's neglect and his own guilty despair.

Kafka's masterpiece of unease and black humour is one of the twentieth century's most influential works of fiction.

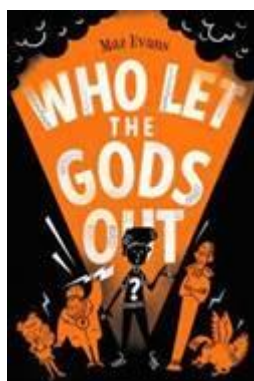

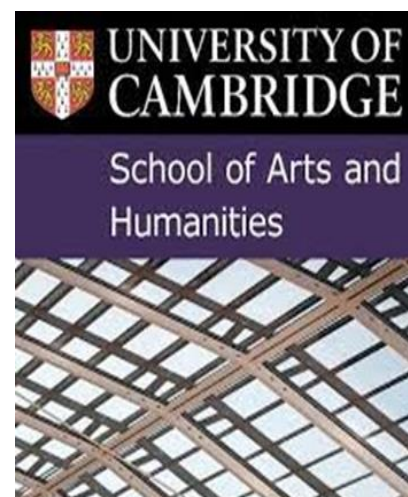
