
Welcome to this month's edition of **Beverley Highlife**. I hope that you will enjoy reading about what has been happening this month at Beverley High School.

Irish Dance Stars







Beverley High School sisters, Anabelle and Orla Wormald, who have been dancing since they were three years old, this month took part in the Great Britain Irish Dancing Championships in London. As a prestigious international event, competitors come from all over the world including as far afield as Canada, America, China and Australia.

Orla, who took part in the under twelve category, placed sixth overall and continues to be **ranked 2nd in the UK**. She also placed **4th in the world** at the World Championships last April in Belfast, an accomplishment she describes as her greatest achievement.

Anabelle took part in the under fifteen age group placing forty-second out of two hundred competitors ranking her **19**th in the UK.

Both girls train for three nights a week with world champion Nadine Martin at her Academy of Irish Dance in Thorne. Whilst they love competing, they agree that the most rewarding part of their dancing is the fitness they have and the friends they have made. They are now hoping to qualify for the World Championships, which will be held in Montreal, Canada next Easter, and are working hard towards this goal.

Well done Orla and Anabelle, what amazing athletes you are....your school is very proud of you! And thank you to mum who made us aware of your outstanding achievements.

The Autumn term has begun with the cross-country season. On Thursday 29 September sixty students in Years 7-9 competed in the inter-house cross country competition. We then took a Junior and Intermediate team to compete at the first round of the English Schools Cross Country competition at Pocklington school on October 10th.

It really was an amazing team effort, with both the Junior team (Year 7 & 8) and the Intermediate team (Year 9 & 10) coming second overall, beating eight other schools in the area, only to be beaten by a school from Sheffield. All six runners in our Junior team managed to come in the top twenty, which again is a fantastic achievement. This now means that both teams have qualified for the regional round in Leeds.

Netball



We have been so pleased with the number of students coming down to play Netball at lunch and after school. We are now looking into putting on a separate club for some year groups because the numbers attending are so high. We have organised some friendly fixtures against local schools in a league this year, as well as competing in the Top Schools competition and East Riding tournaments. It is also great to hear that so many students are playing in clubs outside of school and for their county both through training and matches.

A round-up of the fixtures played so far:

Our Year 7 & 8 teams played against South Hunsley, both came away with a win. The Year 7 team showed great potential and thoroughly enjoyed their first match. The Year 8 team are really starting to work together well and are going from strength to strength with each game they play.

The U16 team played against some tough competition at the Top Schools tournament at Wolfreton, winning against Tranby, drawing against Wolfreton but then losing to Hornsea and South Hunsley. Unfortunately, this means they won't go through to the next round, but the students enjoyed the competition and showed great team spirit throughout.

Our Year 9 & 10 teams played a home match against Cottingham High School, it was nice to be able to have the chance for lots of students to play. Both Beverley teams managed to secure a win.

The U14 Top Schools' tournament was between South Hunsley and Beverley High. Our U14 team played amazingly well, again working well as a team, and managing to win the match, this means they go through to the next stage in the competition against schools in Hull. This team is still undefeated in their area since last year — what an achievement!

Football

We have entered the Humberside schools league again this year and look forward to these matches starting after half term. We are hoping to have some other friendly fixtures against local schools, as well as the Year 7 & 8 tournaments coming up.



Later in the year we will be running an inter house football competition in school, which I am sure all our budding footballers will enjoy.






Tutor Reading Book of the Month: Annie John by Jamaica Kincaid
