Kofi walked from the BBC studios in Hull to his home in Withernsea, 22 miles away. Along the way he invited some local charities to walk and talk with him and Mental Health Mates Beverley were asked to join the Hedon to Thorngumbald leg which included visiting their primary schools to watch Kofi take part in a challenge set by the children.

Poppy has helped her mum to run Mental Health Mates in Beverley for 3½ years and she also supports many other community projects. Mental Health Mates is a peer support walking group which meet regularly to walk and talk without fear of judgement. As a group they are passionate about breaking down the stigma attached to mental health in both adults and children and they do this by encouraging people to talk openly and honestly about their mental health. Poppy is a huge part of the group and is always there with a smile to welcome the members.

Poppy was interviewed by both BBC Radio Humberside and Look North and she helped raise over £200.00. Well done Poppy, your school is very proud of you and thanks to your mum for letting us know.

In school we raised almost £800 to donate to Children in Need from the non-uniform day and the staff versus sixth form volleyball match. Congratulations to the sixth form who, once again, beat the staff!

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


Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition Awards

One of these was a 'gold finalist award' which meant that the entry was within the top 154! 

The programme is designed to boost students' confidence with reading for pleasure and progress and we are grateful to parents and carers who are engaging in the two fifteenminute reading sessions per week with their child. The programme lasts for twelve weeks and is designed to focus on building vocabulary as well as comprehension, reading fluency and inference. We are proud of the fact that we have a bespoke, in-house Reading Programme as reading is at the centre of how our students access the curriculum, as well as their successes later in life.

Tutor Reading Book of the Month: The Woman in Black by Susan Hill

Students in Years 9 and 10 have the opportunity to read *The Woman in Black* by Susan Hill as part of the tutor reading programme. We decided to feature this Gothic novel this half-term as the opening chapter is set on Christmas Eve – the perfect time to stay indoors and scare yourself with a good book!

Arthur Kipps, a junior solicitor, is summoned to attend the funeral of Mrs Alice Drablow, the house's sole inhabitant of Eel Marsh House, unaware of the tragic secrets which lie hidden behind the shuttered windows. The house stands at the end of a causeway, wreathed in fog and mystery, but it is not until he glimpses a wasted young woman, dressed all in black, at the funeral, that a creeping sense of unease begins to take hold, a feeling deepened by the reluctance of the locals to talk of the woman in black - and her terrible purpose.


